Gnowangerup F

Mount Barker

Renowned for its natural beauty, exotic wildflowers, local characters and a huge variety of phenomenal sightseeing attractions, the Porongurup is the complete tourism destination.

Bremer Bay No

Jerramungup L

Jerramungup is the western gateway to Fitzgerald River National Park, covering over 329,000 hectares. It's one of the largest and most botanically significant national parks in Australia and home to 1,800 spectacular rare plant species and some of the most ecologically significant flora in the world.

Explore the spectacular landscapes via 4WD, take to the river in a kayak, or bushwalk amongst the blooms of exotic wildflowers.




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

Wildflowers

The abundance and diversity of flora in the Great Southern Treasures is truly unique.

The South West of Western Australia has been named one of the world's 34 global diversity hotspots. There are 8000 species of wildflowers across the region (in contrast, the UK has only 1500), half of which are found nowhere else in the world.

Keep an eye out for: Mountain Bells, Magenta Queen of Sheba orchids, and the distinctive Stirling Range banksia.

Please do not pick the wildflowers. The potential impact can be quite devastating to populations of some species that require the setting of seed for regeneration.


The Horsepower Highway 🛭

Bloom Festival

The signature event of the region, the Bloom Festival encompasses more than 50 events staged during the first month in spring and across the nine shires of the Great Southern Treasures region. The festival celebrates the renewal of spring focusing on the region's exotic wildflowers, incredible landscapes and natural beauty, providing unique experiences for visitors from all around the country.

Events include arts and crafts, displays and exhibitions, creative workshops, food and wine events, tours, markets, Noongar culture events, open gardens, heritage trails, guided tours and hikes through the Stirlings.





Kodja Place Cultural Centre

The Kodja Place is home to a multifaceted display of artefacts, stories, interactive displays, exhibits, and hands-on devices depicting changing rural life over 200 years.

Outside in the Rose Maze, trace the stories of Yoondi, Elizabeth and Maria to learn of Noongar, English and Italian experiences from the last 100 years.

Within the Kodja g'allery, experience the journey from traditional Noongar life to modern farming.



Mount Barker Murals

International artists painted a series of 7 murals throughout the town of Mount Barker, celebrating local history, during the Mountains & Murals Festival in 2019. Returning in 2022 for part 2, completing the trail of 14 spectacular murals through the town.



National Parks

National Parks are one of the best ways to experience the region, all of which offer scenic drive trails, hikes, & picture perfect picnic areas. An ideal time to visit is late spring to early summer when the parks are bursting with bright blooming wildflowers.



Fitzgerald River National Park M4

In 2017 this botanical wonderland received global recognition, as UNESCO (United Nations Educational, Scientific & Cultural Organisation) approved the park as a Biosphere Reserve.

This Park is one of the larger national parks in WA, covering 329,039 hectares of unspoiled wilderness located along one of the most magnificent stretches of Australian coast. Much of the coastline is accessible via 2WD, as are the new facitlities including picnic areas, viewing platforms & walking trails to Barrens Beach & lookout, Four Mile Beach & East Hamersley Inlet.

TIP: During winter, the Cave Point viewing platform offers a fantastic vantage point for whale watching.



Wineries

The Great Southern wine region is one of the largest in the world. Made up of five of the most successful vineyards in the country, 3 of which are located right here within the Great Southern Treasures.

The Great Southern Wine region is located in Minang Noongar country. History is alive with some of the oldest, permanently settled towns in Western Australia. From idyllic seaside towns, to sprawling agricultural lands and national parks, the Great Southern Treasures is one of Australia's most pristine regions.

Yongergnow Australian Malleefowl Centre :

This award-winning centre for community, culture and conservation focuses on the mallee and one of its most intriguing inhabitants, the endangered Malleefowl. Visitors have the unique opportunity to see this magnificent bird in a 1,200m² natural habitat aviary.



Porongurup National Park

The massive ancient granite domes of the Porongurup National Park rises 670 metres high, providing exhilarating views of the undulating farmland to Albany on the south coast, with views to Mt Gardner and Mt Manypeaks at the south-east.

Granite Skywalk

One of the most unique experiences in the Great Southern is the Granite Skywalk. Located on the top of Castle Rock in the Porongurup National Park, this incredible structure is bolted into a massive granite boulder (Castle Rock).

This remote engineering marvel provides safe access and simulates a rock climbing perspective suspended on ropes.



Stirling Range National Park

The park encloses the only major mountain range with in the southern half of Western Australia. The rugged peaks, which rise to more than 1000 metres above sea level, feature stark cliff faces, sheltered gullies, magnificent views and a rich diversity of rare wildflowers.

Park pass required. Facilities include a large car park, information shelters, picnic area, public toilets and water access points.

Bluff Knoll 66

Bluff Knoll is one of the highest peaks and most spectacular peaks in Western Australia reaching 1095m above sea level. The trail starts at the Bluff Knoll car park and requires a moderate level of fitness. Allow 3 -4 hours, with parts of the 6.5km track being rough and

Be prepared for sudden cold changes in the weather on the mountain and prepare accordingly.
